If you have any idea please feel free to call any of the board members. We will certainly take into consideration any and all ideas.



1999 TOUR OF HOMES

The 1999 Tour of Homes includes the following houses:

315 W. Prospect Avenue

Ken, Kris and Ann Sager

This home was built by John and Martha Wharton in 1870. John spent many years in the lumber business and in 1882 helped to organize the Fox River Paper Company, serving as Vice President and General Manager. This Italian Villa style home was purchased by Ken and Dody Sager in 1981. The home and the grounds have been beautifully restored with the help of their daughters Ann and Kris. Truly a home not to be missed with its 11 foot ceilings, 4,300 square feet of living space complete with a library.

410 W. Prospect Avenue

Dan and Patti Coenen

Built in 1910 by Frank and Anna Slattery is a 3 story Colonial Revival. The Slatterys owned and operated a confectionery on College Avenue for 3 generations. Other owners of the home include Herbert Fassbender, who founded Kaukauna Club Cheese and is credited with the invention of cold pack cheese. The Fassbenders owned the house from 1915 to 1965. In 1965 the Dr. Charles Dungar Family moved in. Dr. Dungar is credited with the delivery of many babies here in Appleton. After Dr. Dungar's death Mrs. Dungar remained in the home until 1997 when the Coenens bought it.

621 W. 5th Street

This 1904 Colonial Revival/Shingle Style home was built in 1904 by Henry Wickert. The home was originally yellow and green and stands as one of the finer examples of this style. Henry Wickert was a papermaker who resided at 620 W. Fifth Street prior to building his dream home. The house was remodeled by Jim and Karen Pfefferle. The kitchen was enlarged, making sure that the style was in keeping with the original style of the home. As most of the interior work had been done when the new owners moved in, Brad and David have done extensive work in the yard and have created some lovely gardens which will be seen on the home tour.

503 W. Prospect Avenue

Pat and Jayne McCormick

This Prairie School style home was built by Erven and Margaret Hoffmann, owners of the Puritan Bakery, in 1922.

In 1953 the home was purchased by the John R. Long family, owners of Long Moving and Storage. The Longs resided there until 1997 when it was purchased by the McCormicks. Since purchasing the house Pat and Jayne have been doing much work to restore the home from having new retaining walls built around the yard, to restoring the the wood floors and other interior work.
